DuPage Not-for-Profits Receive Nearly \$270,000 in Grants

The DuPage Foundation was pleased to award nearly \$270,000 in grants to 30 notfor-profits working in the areas of Animal Welfare, Arts and Culture, Education, and the Environment as part of our 2018 Fall Community Needs grant cycle. Grants were distributed at our Holiday Open House in December.

Thirty-six grants totaling \$506,000 were also awarded to DuPage Health and Human Services agencies during our **2018 Spring Community Needs** grant cycle last June.

For the Fall cycle, the Foundation received 113 applications in 2018, significantly more than the number of requests from previous years.

"The increase in requests illustrates the growing need for funding that our county's not-for-profits are facing," said **Barb Szczepaniak**, Foundation vice president for programs. "As the number of requests

increases, we cannot be more appreciative of our generous donors and fund advisors whose support increases our Community Needs budget."

Because of grant recommendations from advisors to our donor-advised funds, the Foundation awarded an additional **\$234,000** from our two Community Needs grant cycles in 2018.

Perma-Seal Fund advisors recommended a partial grant enabling the Foundation to award **\$20,000** to **Literacy DuPage's** tutoring program for non-English speaking adults.

"We teach people how to speak, understand, read, and write in English, and we're specifically planning to work with employers in DuPage County, including Perma-Seal, to help employees improve their work-based literacy through tutoring," said Executive Director **Therese McMahon**. "This grant means the world to us and to so many of our learners."

Animal welfare was a new grant category in 2018 and is an example of how the Foundation connects donors with causes about which they care. Inspired by his lifelong love for his dogs, a donor established the **Companions' Fund**, a permanent endowment

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Imagination Ball Raises Nearly \$440,000



From surprise Golden Tickets to scrumdiddlyumptious cocktails and entrees to an everlasting supply of candy and fun, the DuPage Foundation's **2018 Imagination Ball** was a night to remember as it generated nearly **\$440,000** for Foundation operations and programs aimed at raising the quality of life throughout DuPage County.

Held on November 17 at The Westin at Yorktown Center in Lom-

bard, the Imagination Ball has so far raised more than \$360,000 for the Foundation's **Operating Fund** with contributions still being received.

The Foundation also secured nearly \$77,000 in support of our Next Generation Initiative (NGI) Community Innovation Matching Grant Challenge and Paddle Raise which benefited our NGI Fund and three grantees: Little Friends, NAMI DuPage, and Teen Parent Connection.

These organizations each received grants of \$12,500 after being selected as part of a competitive application process for having successfully established creative and innovative solutions to community needs.

"With more than 260 guests, this year's Benefit was our largest and most successful to date," said **Dorothy O'Reilly**, Foundation trustee and event chair.

"It was fantastic to have so many Foundation friends and partners on hand to celebrate with us. Their support is vital to our success and is what fuels our ability to increase the breadth of our community impact each year. We are truly grateful for their generosity and investment in our work."

focused on supporting animal welfare projects.

A.D.O.P.T. Pet Shelter was thrilled to be a first-time grant recipient of the Foundation.

"This grant will allow A.D.O.P.T. to help pets and their families who are experiencing a personal crisis due to illness, hospitalization, rehab, foreclosure, etc. by providing short-term foster care for pets," said A.D.O.P.T. Executive Director **Chris Stirn**.

During this past fiscal year, **\$4.8 million** was awarded from the Foundation's more than 325 funds on behalf of our donors and community.

Dare to Dream Inspires Latinas to Make Big Plans

January 2019 marked the 11th year for the **Dare to Dream: Get Educated!** conference, which received an \$8,500 Community Needs grant, partially funded by the **Donor-Advised Fund for Needy Children.**

This conference brought 278 middle-school Latina girls and 232 parents or mentors to the **McAninch Arts Center at the College of DuPage** to learn about setting goals and the lifelong economic and personal value of higher education. Applying for college, financial aid, and career opportunities were also discussed by students and their adult mentors.

Four DuPage-area American Association of University Women (AAUW) branches work with the Regional Office of Education and local school districts to design the program. More than 100 volunteers work to present the conference and provide follow-up contact with the students. Evaluations consistently show that attendees believe the conference has a positive impact on them.

In addition, \$1,000 scholarships are made available to Dare to Dream attendees who are graduating in 2019.

Healthy Lifestyles Grants Total More Than \$100,000

Healthy Lifestyles grant recipients received funding early this year to support four evidence-based programs that encourage healthy eating and physical activity. The grants totaled \$105,000 and were provided by the JCS Arts, Health and Education Fund of the DuPage Foundation. Recipients included:



Bridge Communities' Reality Kitchen Program

This two-part nutrition program provides handson tips for planning, shopping, and preparing quick, healthy, and affordable meals for homeless families who are transitioning to permanent housing. Participants start with a workshop on the basics of nutrition taught by a registered dieti-

tian. Family members then participate in one-on-one sessions that include finding recipes for healthy meals, developing a grocery list, shopping, and learning how to read food labels. At the final session, the client family prepares ten meals.



The GardenWorks Project Home Gardening Program

The program provides 300 low-income clients with a raised garden bed, gardening tools, and a volunteer coach to ensure a successful first produce harvest. The

overall goal is for clients to develop life-long gardening skills and to become more knowledgeable about healthy eating and cooking with nutrient-dense foods on a budget.



Northern Illinois Food Bank Whole Body Approach to Disease Prevention Program

This healthy-eating educational program directed toward low-income individuals with diabetes and other chronic health problems will be provided for Midwest Shelter for Homeless Veterans and

Wayne Township Food Pantry clients. During a 10-week period, participants will learn lifestyle changes that reduce diabetes risk, including eating more fruits and vegetables and healthy movement. The goal is to encourage behaviors that decrease the development of chronic diseases.



UCP Seguin of Greater Chicago Project FUN (Fitness and Ultimate Nutrition) Pilot Program

healthy eating education to adults with developmental and intellectual disabilities who live in five of the organization's group homes. The program will help participants make better choices through diet and exercise, reduce reliance on medical treatment, and lower the number of emergency room and health-care visits that might be due to inadequate diet and exercise. The pilot is expected to be replicated at the remaining 71 homes in DuPage and Cook counties.

Squire Fund Nears \$1 Million in Grants

"The John W. Squire Fund has given hope and opportunity to thousands of PRC families struggling with hunger and poverty," said officials from People's Resource Center.

Emergency Fund Aids Evangelical Agency After Fire

Last year, the **Evangelical Child and Family Agency** (ECFA) in Wheaton suffered a terrible fire. Along with damage to their building, ECFA's files received extensive smoke and water damage.

ECFA received a **\$5,000** grant from the DuPage Foundation **Emergency Fund**. According to **Barb Szczepaniak**, Foundation vice president for programs, the Emergency Fund, established in 2014, offers a way for the Foundation and its donors to do something immediately when there is a crisis in the county.

From fires that can affect low-income residents in apartment buildings to extreme weather damage, the fund can be tapped quickly to get agencies and the clients they help back on their feet.

"We can be very nimble and respond quickly," Szczepaniak said.

The funds were used by ECFA as a match to help it garner other gifts, including \$12,000 during its annual Christmas in July appeal.

ECFA is a Christian social services agency that offers services such as adoption, child welfare services, counseling, and pregnancy care.

It started because ECFA saw a need to assist women with unplanned pregnancies and homes for children in the foster care system. The agency currently has offices in both Illinois and Wisconsin.

The loss of the building has not affected the day-to-day services for the community. Rebuilding is taking place and ECFA is planning to move back this summer.

ECFA's files were sent to be treated to remove the smoke smell and dry-frozen to remove the moisture. Moving forward, they intend to maintain the files digitally.
